OFFICIAL ANNOUNCEMENT

REVISED ABSENCE REGULATIONS

The Executive Board after concurrence by the faculty acting through its Executive Committee has adopted the following revision of absence regulations, published here for general information pending inclusion in the *Blue Book*.

A. PRESENT FORM, *Blue Book*, p. 7

1. The instructor is responsible for the settlement of all matters pertaining to attendance in his classes.
2. A daily attendance record of all students should be kept. This constitutes a permanent record and must be preserved.

REVISED FORM

1. No change.
2. The instructor may keep a daily attendance record of his students or not do so according to what he believes to be in the best interest of educational accomplishment. All faculty, however, are expected to be alert to absenteeism that is detrimental to a student's performance, and to call to the attention of the appropriate faculty adviser or dean such cases of repeated or prolonged absence as are detrimental to the student's progress.

B. PRESENT FORM, *Blue Book*, p. 7; *White Book*, p. 20

All classes will be held at the scheduled hour on the day before and after Thanksgiving, Christmas, and Easter recess, except with permission of the deans. Each instructor will report to the student's dean for appropriate action the name of each student who is absent from class the day before or after such a recess.

REVISED FORM

All classes will be held at the scheduled hour on the day before and after Thanksgiving, Christmas, and Easter recess, and all other holidays. Both faculty and students are expected to be present.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The election, which was held at the annual meeting of the Carnegie Tech board April 9, included seven new members, re-election of two alumni trustees, and election of three former term trustees as life trustees.

The new members elected for first terms as special term trustees were Mr. Charles M. Beeghly, president of Jones & Laughlin Steel Corporation; Mr. Ernest D. Brockett, president of Gulf Oil Corporation; Mr. Lawrence Litchfield, Jr., president of the Aluminum Company of America; Mr. S. M. Jenks, executive vice president, Engineering and Research,

Division of Student Affairs

The Office of the Director of Admissions has been established to:

1. Present and interpret Carnegie Tech's objectives and opportunities to prospective students and their parents in co-operation with the college deans and the Director of Public Relations.
2. Maintain effective liaison with secondary schools and junior colleges.
3. Obtain and prepare information on the qualifications of applicants for admission for action by the Committee on Undergraduate Admissions.
4. Administer the actions of the Committee on Undergraduate Admissions.
5. Administer the advanced standing credit procedure including advanced placement freshmen.
6. Make recommendations to the college deans for freshman scholarships.

The policy for undergraduate admission is established by the council of each college. Power to pass upon applications and qualifications which are clear is delegated to the Director of Admissions. In other cases, the dean of the college and the Director of Admissions make the decision. The Director of Admissions, as head of his office, reports to the Dean of the Division of Student Affairs. The Committee on Undergraduate Admissions, of which the Director of Admissions is Chairman, meets only when policy matters involving all colleges are to be considered. This committee is comprised of the Dean of the Division of Student Affairs, the Dean of the Division of Humanities and Social Sciences, the Dean of the College of Engineering and Science, the Dean of the College of Fine Arts, the Dean of Margaret Morrison Carnegie College, and the Director of Admissions.

The process through which the desired freshman enrollment of 800 students is recruited and admitted each year is complex and detailed. It ranges from answering queries about Carnegie Tech through evaluation of applicants' credentials to disseminating information about each applicant admitted to the proper offices on campus. Approximately 1,500 applicants are accepted for admission each year from more than 3,000 who apply. The freshman

drop out rate here compares very favorably with other colleges of our type.

For each applicant the Admissions Office compiles facts concerning scholastic preparation, recommendations of the high school principal and counselor, College Entrance Examination Board test scores, in order to make a preliminary evaluation of qualifications. Applicants are then notified of acceptance or non-acceptance after action either by the dean of the college or the Director of Admissions. Those who are admitted are sent dormitory applications. To signify acceptance applicants file a \$50 tuition deposit. Often applicants and their parents will visit Carnegie Tech for an interview and to see the campus; or, if a student lives in a distant city, one of the alumni interviewers will visit him. Approximately 48,000 pieces of mail go between the Admissions Office and prospective applicants and applicants each year.

The Admissions Office also administers the freshman scholarships. For the 1961-62 year, 1,703 prospective students applied for scholarship aid. Awards were available for 231 freshmen and 146 of these were accepted.

Once admission is accepted, the Office prepares lists of the new students for the Dean of Women, the Dean of Men, the Co-ordinator of Student Activities, and the Health Department. The Office also advises the Military Science Department which students desire ROTC. Cards, recording the secondary school record, rank in class, and CEEB scores, are made for each student. These are used for sectioning purposes by the Assistant Dean for Freshmen in the College of Engineering and Science. The cards are filed by the name of the secondary school and eventually include each student's freshman grade record at Carnegie Tech. The cards are used in determining the performance of students from any specific high school.

The Admissions Office is a liaison between Carnegie Tech and secondary schools and junior colleges. It regularly mails catalogs and other publications of like interest to a list of 4,500 such institutions. The Office also notifies them which of their students have been accepted for admission; sends them the annual *Carnegie Honors* booklet that lists scholarship and prize recipients and other scholastic honors; and, at the end of each semester, the grade reports of freshmen who came from their school. In addition, the Admissions staff participates in college nights and career days and in Parent-Teacher Association panels and programs, counseling and telling high school students and their parents about Carnegie Tech. This work takes the staff into high schools across Pennsylvania, New York, New Jersey, Ohio, Maryland, Illinois, Connecticut, Virginia, and

West Virginia. Each year a dinner is held for high school principals and counselors. The Office also cooperates with the Buhl Planetarium in its School Science Fair and Science Experts Quiz.

To further the interests of Carnegie Tech, membership is maintained in the College Entrance Examination Board, the American Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions Officers, the Middle States Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions Officers, the Association of College Admissions Counselors, the Pennsylvania Association of Colleges and Universities, and the College Scholarship Service of CEEB.

CAMPUS VISITORS

ROBERT DURRER: Professor Robert Durrer, chairman of the board of the Louis de Roll Iron Works, Ltd., at Gerlafingen, Switzerland, will deliver a lecture on "Fundamental Opinions on Ironmaking in the Past and in the Future," April 12. The lecture, open to the public, will be at 3:30 pm in Porter Hall 100. Born in Switzerland, Professor Durrer received his degrees from Technische Hochschule, Aachen. During World War II, he founded the Lehrstuhl für Metallurgie at the Swiss Federal Institute of Technology, Zurich. For almost thirty years, he has been concerned with the problem of producing iron with the aid of oxygen. He has been a member of the Iron and Steel Institute since 1929 and in 1947 was elected an honorary vice president.

HENRY J. COWAN. Henry J. Cowan, head of the department of architectural science, University of Sydney, Australia, will deliver a lecture on "Mechanization of Structural Design" in Room 210 in the College of Fine Arts at 4 pm on April 13. Professor Cowan, who is also editor of the *Architectural Science Review*, will review some new structures in Australia. He holds degrees from the University of Manchester and the University of Sheffield. His work includes consulting on Babworth House, Australia's tallest building, and on the Chevron Hilton.

SEIGFRIED FLUGGE. Dr. Seigfried Flugge, professor at the University of Marburg, Germany, will serve as a visiting lecturer, April 16-20, under the auspices of the American Association of Physics Teachers and the American Institute of Physics. While at Carnegie Tech, Dr. Flugge will give a colloquium and seminars on "The Three Body Problem in Nuclear Physics." Dr. Flugge has been a Senate member and Dean of the Philosophical Faculty at the University of Marburg for several years. He has contributed many articles to technical journals as well as being Editor and Co-editor of *Handbuch der Physik* and *Ergebnisse der exacten Naturwissenschaften*, respectively. He received his education at Technische Hochschule Dresden and the University of Göttingen where he received his Ph.D.
