OUR IS JUST ONE LESS THAN five. Yet the quadruplets of St. John in New Brunswick have not rought prosperity to themselves or their parents. Born twelve years ago, they have been supported by their ather, a carpenter. Now facing eviction and loss of their meagre furnishings, word of their plight reached the Jewish David Croll-the Minister of Welfare for Ontario and guardian of the quintuplets. Together with Dr. Dafoe and Judge Valin, he has sent money from his own pocket to help them. A collection is being made and the quadruplets-three girls and a boy-may at last bring modest comfort to their parents.

SO THE PROHIBITION MOVEment has reached Palestine. Prohibition will never be needed there as long as the Jew is pious enough to say a blessing before he drinks and a prayer after he drinks. A good Jew cannot become too intoxicated to recite the brief but appropriate prayer of thankfulness.

# Dr. Butler Hits Race 'Myth!'

Special to The Outlook. NEW YORK, Dec. 27. - The Nazi theory of race purity was scored as contrary to history and anthropology by President Nicholas Murray Butler, of Columbia University, in his annual report.

Referring to the race doctrine preached "in at least one modern land," Dr. Butler summed up the race theory in the words of H. A. L. Fisher, historian:

"Purity of race does not exist; Europe is a continent of energetic mongrels and declared original race groups have become so completely intermingled the term 'race' has 'very little meaning.' "

JERUSALEM, Dec. 26. (JTA) -Overriding united opposition of world and Palestine Jewry, the Palestine Government has proclaimed a representative legislative council for Pal-

The official communique, issued on the heels of a meeting between Jewish leaders and High Commissioner Sir Arthur Grenfell Wauchope in which the former gave an emphatic "no" as their answer to the council proposal, has created threats and rumors on all sides.

Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the World Zionist Organization, has asserted the council was not in accordance with the international obligations to Jews inherent in the spirit of the League mandate, and claimed the Jewish community would ignore the new set-up.

Anticipating boycotts against the council. Britain has empowered the High Commissioner to nominate any person he chooses to represent communities not participating.

The council will comprise seven Jews, five Government officials, three Arab Christians, eleven Moslems and two merchants, one of whom it is believed will be a Jew.

Under Dr. Weizmann's leadership. world Jewry is already mobilizing against the Council.

# CLAIM OF COMMUNISM IS BLASTED!

THE charge of a so-called Jewish Communist link made by Adolf Hitler, Chancellor of Germany, at the recent Nuremberg Reichstag meeting which deprived the German Jews of their citizenship, has been repudiated in a declaration to their fellow citizens issued by Dr. Cyrus Adler, president of the American Jewish Committee; Alfred M. Cohen, President of B'nai B'rith, and B. C. Vladeck, chairman of the Jewish Labor Com-

The complete text of the statement reads as follows: To Our Fellow Citizens:

On Sunday, September 15, the present National Socialist Government of Germany, at the behest of its Chancellor, Adolf Hitler, dictator of the German people, decreed a series of laws that put Jews beyond the legal man citizenship. 

# The Sacrifices That Women Make

HEADLINES tell us that four million Italian women have surrendered their world ing pot in order to increase the gold reserve of their country. What beautiful sentiment!

But is it beautiful sentiment to destroy a wedding ring so that more bullets can be purchased so that more human beings can be killed? Was the Queen of Italy doing the right thing when she cast her ring which she had worn for thirty-nine years aside? Or was she merely the victim of fascist regimentation along with millions of her sisters? Casting swords into plowshares is the way to progress; but melting wedding rings into bullets is retrogression towards barbarism. We have often noted on the toil-worn hands of Italian and Sicilian women the broad gold wedding band—the one connection that suggests that these poor souls ever were young or romantic. And now even this is gone.

In Nazi-ridden Germany, the women are also making sacrifices. In an age of enlightenment, when even in Turkey the women have won a degree of freedom, German women have been forced into the KKK-Kirche, Kuche, und Kinder. That is, women must confine themselves to church, kitchens, and child-bearing. Their church is pagan; their kitchens lack butter, milk, cheese, and other basic foods; their children are consigned to slaughter. Like guinea pigs in a cage, they multiply at the will of an experimenter; they eat what is allowed them; they die. In the past year the birth rate increased over 22% while in Ireland, Norway, Sweden, Poland, and the Union of South Africa there was no increase whatsoever: and in twenty other countries, there is an actual decrease. In fascist Italy, the supply of cannon-fodder increases too.

# Uncover Ancient Ossuaries! - By M. L. Avner -

SSUARIES, dating back to several centuries before the destruction of Palestine and bearing Hebrew inscriptions, have been uncovered recently in a number of caves on a hill and its slopes in the valley of Kedron, outside the old city of Jerusalem, by Dr. Eliezer Sukenik, of the Hebrew Uni versity, who has been conducting an exploring expedition of the ancient

necropolis of Jerusalem for many years in order to shed light on the burial customs of the children of Israel.

The ossuaries were contained in well kept caves in which there were

formed specimens of pottery used as funeral ornaments.

The ossuaries bore Greek and He brew Inscriptions naming Martha the daughter of Annias. Mariam Salome, Jonathan, Simon and other ancient names referred to in the New Testament. Remarkably well pre served skeletons were uncovered These discoveries are of great archae ological value and are expected to throw light on the racial problems

of the period. Dr. Sukenik intends to undertake anthropological measurements with special instruments.

IN this brief summary, an attempt will be made to touch only a few highlights of Jewish social welfare work during the past year. It should be emphasized that much has failed of mention because of the limited confines of this summary. Generalizing, however, one may state that although American Jewry has not as yet returned to its standard of giving which characterized the period from 1924 to 1928, the various social welfare activities have been substantially maintained during these depression years under very severe and trying operating conditions. # SOCIAL SERVICES

Family Relief Since the depression, every year

has seen larger and larger demands made upon Jewish family welfare and relief societies for care and services by needy clients. This past year has shown the first tendency toward a decline. But in spite of this reduction in demand the actual need for relief funds and for social services still exceed those of the years 1927, 1928, when American Jewry supported these organizations much more adequately than at present. Some 25,-000 Jewish families are at present under the care of about 40 reporting Jewish family welfare agencies. Their expenditures during the past year exceeded three million dollars, both for relief and service. This amount was larger than the total spent in 1927, 1928, 1929 or 1930. Jewish agencies are straining every effort to meet their obligations under the pressure of greatly reduced contributions from Jewish sources. It is hoped that this year's drives for local Jewish philanthropic work will bring forth the necessary increases in giving, to help safeguard the work which Jewish relief organizations have so carefully and successfully nutured throughout these depression years. Child Care

During the past year about 10,000 Jewish children were under the care of some 30 Jewish child care agencies doing work of an acceptable character. This number is larger than in the years 1927, 1928, 1929, 1930 or 1931. The trend is away from institutionalization, with a greater tendency toward care in private or foster-home. Expenditures for the care of these children, likewise have increased above the amounts required in the pre-depression years. Jewish contributions for this work has lagged, but by the use of reserves, reductions in salaries and operating costs and in other ways, the emergency to date has been bridged. But increased contributions to Federations, Welfare Funds and individual agency appeals must be made in order to make possible a continuation of present childcare services on the decent level that they should be carried.

Medical Care The 37 reporting hospitals under Jewish auspices record almost three million days' care provided during the past year. This represents an increase of over 5 percent over the preceding year. This increase was paralleled by increased demands for bed utilization. About 10 percent more people applied for medical care than the year before. It is interesting to note that only one hospital of the 37 reported 100 percent Jewish clientele. About half of the hospitals have a non-Jewish clientele varying from 50 to over 75 percent.

Dispensary services have shown similar consistent increases year after year throughout the years of the depression. Some 40 dispensaries, clinics and out-patient departments report close to 2,500,000 visits for medical care and service. Not a single one of these clinics serves a 100 percent Jewish clientele. About half of



1 large stalk celery 6 medium onions

1 large can bean sprouts or two small cans

1 small can mushrooms 3 tablespoons soy sauce (mixture of soy beans, salt, and water)

1 teaspoon salt 1 teaspoon sugar

3 tablespoons flour or cornstarch 2 tablespoons chicken fat

Cover the meat with water and boil on top of the stove for about an hour and a half or until the meat is tender. Cut into small pieces. Strain the water from the meat and skim off the fat. Mix the flour, soy sauce, salt, sugar and water from the meat. Cook on a small fire until thick. Melt the fat in a pan. Add the diced onions and celery and saute (fry until tender but not brown). Add meat, thickening, mushrooms, and drained bean sprouts. Place over hot water and cook for ten minutes or until ready to serve. Serve with fried noodles or plain boiled rice, Garnish with strips of fried beaten


