Dr. Freehof Opens Y Lecture Series

The Isaac Seder Educational Center opens its 1965-66 season on October 25 with an outstanding array of lectures and classes.

Leading off the lecture series will be Dr. Solomon B. Freehof, who starts with a discussion of "Job" in the series called "The Most Fascinating Person Who Never Lived and Never Died."

In this exciting series will also be Professor Austin Wright, Chairman of the Department of English at Carnegie Tech, who will discuss "Hamlet."

Dr. Richard L. Rubenstein will speak on "Ivan Karamazov" and Dr. George Swetnam, noted historian, author and lecturer, will discuss "Robin Hood."

Rounding out the series of six sessions on the subject will be Dr. Fred Sochatoff, Carnegie Tech Professor, who will speak on "Oedipus" and Jeremiah O'Mara of the University of Pittsburgh and Western Psychiatric Institute whose subject will be "Faust."

This series follows a most successful group of lectures given last year on "The Most Famous Person Who Ever Lived." It will be followed by a second group of six lectures beginning in January with such famous personalities as Bishop John J. Wright, Judge Michael A. Musmanno, Gladys Schmitt and others.

In addition to this series Dr. Richard L. Rubenstein, Charles E. Merrill, Lecturer in the Humanities at the University of Pittsburgh and Director B'nai B'rith Hillel Foundation, will present a

Rudolf Serkin, Nathan Milstein, Matislav Rostropovich, Rosalyn Tureck, Sidney Harth and other world famous solo recital artists are gathering to make personal appearances at the YM&WHA Musical Society this season in celebration of the Society's Fortieth Annual Concert Series.

Organized in 1926, the YM&WHA Musical Society Series is today the oldest musical series of any kind in this part of the country. Despite a star studded list, the Musical Society offers its great musical excitement to the entire community at no raise in membership dues as its gift to Pittsburgh.

Pianists Serkin and Tureck; violinists Milstein and Harth; singers Ivan Petrov, the first concert in his first United States tour of the premiere basso of the Bolshoi Opera, and Marilyn Horne, the Pittsburgh recital debut of the magnificent soprano; world's leading cellist Rostropovich and others come together in this amazing all-star season to celebrate music in Pittsburgh.

Because the community has gratefully accepted the Y Musical Society's gift, there is assurance of a sell-out for every concert even before the first curtain goes up on the premiere appearance of Ivan Petrov on Wednesday, October 27.

On eight Wednesday evenings at 8:40, music lovers will be able to delight in the "Thrill of Discovery" as the Y's 1965-66 Series presents three debuts, re-introduces four long time world favorites (first introduced to Pittsburgh by the Y) and makes possible the introduction of two young musicians from the Pittsburgh community who are winners of the annual "Herman and Dolores Passaman- eck Auditions."

The membership dues for this season are the standard \$9.00, \$12 and \$15 ticket prices for the entire series. However, at this writing, less than 50 seats remain and only in the \$15 category.

Young Judaea Invites Children To Join and Participate

There's a place for your child in YOUNG JUDAEA; a place to learn, play and make many close friends. Young Judaea was born in 1909, but is as young and alive as its members. There are many new, exciting and interesting programs. In addition, your child discovers the treasures of his heritage and the joy of his Jewish future.

It starts with the Juniors, age 10-12, questioning and trying to grasp and understand who they are, and why they should be interested in all things Jewish. The Intermediates, or "Tweens," are just beginning to try their own wings. Here the history, holidays, songs and dances of our people and the land of Israel come alive. Together with his Young Judaea leader, he plans games, sports, dramatics, contests, parties, trips and other activities that strike his fancy. Each month the Young Judaea magazine arrives—filled with activity stories about Judaeans clubs in various parts of the United States, the Tsofim (Scouts of Israel) through pictures and Pen-Pal letters.

The Senior, of course, does a great deal of thinking and discussing about Judaism, democracy, and Israel. They have read a great deal about "democracy" in our country, and how the entire free world is dependent upon strengthening and extending democracy through the United Nations. They are proud that the young State of Israel has learned that democracy is a way of living and thinking, and that Israel is playing a vital role in helping to develop new nations in Africa through skill training,

health centers, and exchange student programs. The Senior is involved in charting programs on a city, regional and national level, both for himself and for his younger brothers and sisters in Young Judaea. His voice and views are reflected in The Senior, the monthly national newspaper published by and for Senior Judaeans.

The program of Young Judaea is social, cultural and community-centered.

The year started out with an Advisors' Institute, held October 3rd. On October 8th an OCLI, Officers-Chairmen Leadership Institute, was held at the YM&WHA. Its function was to help to prepare Judaeans for future leadership in our community. In the very near future, there will be a Community Get-Together. A week-end at Camp Russell in Oglebay Park has been reserved for October 29, 30, 31, 1965, for the Intermediates and Seniors, for their Fall Convention. The week-end theme is: Jewish Values. Here Judaeans will listen and learn, and assess and evaluate their birthright as Jews; and each Jew's share in the State of Israel.

On November 11th, Juniors and Intermediates will travel to Ohiopyle, where they will tour Falling-water and hike through Ferncliffe. On December 5 a Bon Voyage Luncheon will be held in honor of Naomi Rothstein, President of Ruach B'Tziona Region of Young Judaea, who will travel to Israel as a representative of the Region to the Jewish Youth Conference. On December 19 Young Judaea's annual Chanukah Party for patients at Polk State School and Hospital will be held at the school.

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
Y Midget Varsity

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Y-Center Membership In U.S. Hits New High

NEW YORK—Membership in Jewish Community Centers and YM & WHAs throughout the U.S. has soared to 700,000, a new high which represents close to a 30 percent growth since 1953, the latest volume of the JWB Year Book reveals. JWB is the National Association of YM & WHAs and Jewish Community Centers.

Activities in JCCs and YM & YWHAs attracted the participation of 27,685,000 people in aggregate, over a million more than participated the previous year. Center and Y budgets increased by 6.5 percent, or \$1,900,000, for a record high of \$30,600,000. Since 1948, gross expenditures have tripled, the JWB Year Book reports.

These revealing statistics are included in the JWB Year Book's lead article on "The Jewish Community Center Field—Trends and Observations" by Emanuel Berlatsky, Director, Community Services, JWB. Other key facts reported by Mr. Berlatsky are:

Jewish Community Centers and YM & YWHAs emphasized their role as agencies serving the Jewish needs of communities and increasingly sought to develop an indigenous American Jewish culture in such activities as fine arts, drama, dancing and literature.

Civil rights continued to be a part of the program and interest of JCCs and Ys. Furthermore, Centers participated in such matters of current Jewish concern as the well-being of Soviet Jewry and the modification of United States immigration laws. Centers also became involved in many aspects of the Government's war on poverty.

An increasing number of Centers assumed responsibility for serving Jewish personnel in the Armed Forces and their dependents.

In the face of a growing membership, increased participation in activities and programs, rising expenditures, and added responsibilities, the shortage of skilled professional personnel grew even more critical. The number of unfilled positions increased from 175 to 204. Most critical was the growing difficulty in filling

supervisory and executive positions. Special recruitment projects, buttressed by \$250,000 in scholarship funds, dealt with the situation. Approximately 100 scholarships and fellowships were awarded.

Income increased at the same rate as expenditures. Of the total, 61.2 percent came from membership dues and activity and service fees, and 38.0 percent came from central fundraising bodies. Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds allocated 23.5 percent, an increase over the previous year.

Resident camps increased their bed capacity by 3.5 percent, but 75 percent of the camps had waiting lists of children who could not be served.

Day camps increased their capacity by about 8 percent; this was done by expanding facilities and in some instances, developing new camps.

Mr. Berlatsky based his article in the JWB Year Book on annual reports receive from Jewish Community Centers and YM & YWHAs and supplementary material compiled and analyzed statistically by Samuel Asofsky, Consultant, JWB's Research and Data Services.

Other articles in the JWB Year Book are: "The Jewish Military Chaplaincy," by Rabbi Aryeh Lev, Director, JWB's Commission on Jewish Chaplaincy; "Jewish Community Centers in Continental Europe," by Deborah Miller, Consultant on Centers and Vacation Camps, American Joint Distribution Committee, and "Art Work in Jewish Themes as an Integral Part of the Jewish Community Center," by Julian N. Jablin, former JWB staff member who is now Associate Public Relations Director, Jewish Federation of Metropolitan Chicago.

The JWB Year Book includes a 1965 Directory of Jewish Community Centers and YM & YWHAs, a Bibliography of Articles on the Center Field Published in the Jewish Press, a New JWB Publications List, other appendices and a substantial amount of statistical data on Center membership, finances, program, personnel, and resident and day camping.
