REGISTRATION OPENS FOR HOLIDAY PROGRAMS

Happy Hanukkah To All Groups Mark "Rights" Holiday

Y-IKC groups of all ages are getting ready to celebrate the Hanukkah holiday which begins Tuesday evening, December 10.

The Hanukkah festival, the traditional "Feast of Lights" commemorating the victory of the ancient Maccabees from Assyria, this year falls, appropriately enough, on the evening of "Human Rights Day," a holiday which marks the adoption by the United Nations of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights in 1948.

From nursery school children of three to senior citizens, Y-IKC groups will hold ceremonies and celebrations to mark the double holiday, both of which underscore the goals of democracy and freedom.

Funday Hanukkah

On Dec. 14th, the Fundays programs at IKC will celebrate Hanukkah by having a carnival. The carnival booths will be constructed by the boys in the Senior unit. The decorations and refreshments will be taken care of by the girls in this unit.

The children of the Jr. unit will therefore be entertained by this group and will be asked to dress in costumes representing the Maccabees. There will be a queen and king chosen from this unit to reign over the festivities. The carnival will begin when the queen and king cut a ribbon at the entrance to the carnival. This will be the final day of Trip 1. Trip II will start Jan. 11th.

A Hanukkah celebration will be held Sunday evening, December 15, at the Y at 9:00 p.m. sponsored by the Renaissance Social Club. Candles will be lit and Hanukkah songs as part of community singing.

The social will feature refreshments and dancing. The affair is open to unattached adults over age 28. Admission is 50c for members and 75c for non-members.

Dr. Poupko Talks On Prophet Amos

Rabbi Dr. Bernard A. Poupko, nationally distinguished scholar and lecturer, will lecture at the Irene Kaufmann Center in Squirrel Hill on Thursday evening, Dec. 12, at 8:30 p.m. on "Amos" in his series entitled "The Earlier Prophets—Their Message and Influence."

Rabbi Poupko will discuss—His reaction to social justice—Amos the shepherd vs. the sophisticated Urbanite—"Seek me and Live"—Universality of religious and moral law—"The Chosen People"—Ritual and the moral law—Conflict by the Priest and Prophet—Ahad Ha'am's thesis — The difference between Amos' "call to justice" and Hosea's "demand for truth," in his final lecture in this series.

The impact of the Hebrew Prophets upon humanity is virtually beyond description and calculation. Their passionate plea for social justice, moral consciousness and ethical behavior continues to challenge the human mind and to stir its heart. The teachings and the legacy of six of these Prophets are discussed in this series.

BASIC JUDAISM

The need for an accurate, concise presentation of contemporary Jewish belief and practice for adults has often been expressed. In 1947, the late Rabbi Milton Steinberg filled an important need by presenting his introduction to contemporary Jewish thought BASIC JUDAISM. Since that time, much has happened in the Jewish world to call for a restatement of Basic Judaism in terms of the experience of the 1960's. These lectures aim to present in a simple, yet adult manner, some of the fundamentals of Contemporary Judaism.

On Wednesday evening, January 15, Dr. Rubenstein will discuss JEWISH HISTORY AND JUDAISM—An overview of the highlights of Jewish history as they influenced the development of the principal concerns of Judaism. The titles of the rest of the lectures: THE MEANING OF TORAH IN JUDAISM; THE MEANING OF GOD IN JEWISH EXPERIENCE; THE NATURE OF MAN IN JEWISH THOUGHT; THE ROLE OF RELIGIOUS PRACTICE IN JUDAISM and THE MEANING OF THE MESSIAH IN JUDAISM.

84 Scholarships For Social Work

NEW YORK—Eighty-four scholarship grants were awarded for the 1963-64 school year to 69 students for graduate education in social work by Jewish Community Centers and YM-WHAs, the National Association of Jewish Center Workers and the National Jewish Welfare Board.

Mrs. Robert M. Klein of New York, chairman of JWB's national scholarship committee, who made the announcement this week, said that the grants ranged from scholarships of \$1,000 to work-study plans valued at \$6,500. All of the

The YM&WHA-IKC of Pittsburgh offers two social group fellowships for center work sponsored by the Henry Kaufmann Foundation of New York. Fellowships are for two years' study at the University of Pittsburgh Graduate School of Social Work.

students plan careers in Jewish Community Center work. Three of the 69 students won JWB's National Merit Fellowship Awards and two others received grants from the National Association of Jewish Center Workers. The others were awarded scholarships by 31 Jewish Community Centers and seven JWB Regions.

To be eligible for these awards, students must be accepted at an accredited graduate school of social work and must be interested in Center work as a career. All applications are made through JWB's Personnel and Training Services, 145 E. 32nd St., New York, N.Y. Final selections are made by scholarship committees. In most cases, students are obligated to return to the Jewish Community Center which awarded the scholarship, at least for a two-year period after graduation.

Helene Shifrin Reps' Concert Review

Helene Shifrin Reps is an artist of sense and sensibility. Her singing Wednesday, Nov. 20, on the YM&WHA Musical Society Series left no doubt as to that fact. There was, to begin with, the challenge of her program itself. Embracing, as it did, a diversity of musical styles from four centuries and asking for performances in five languages, its challenge, both to vocal technique and to musicianship, was a severe one. Miss Reps more than met that challenge. Her voice has warmth and color, but it is also remarkably clear. It is an instrument capable of the kind of power demonstrated in Ravel's "Kaddisch," but also of the kind of delicate shading and subtle variety in color that were in evidence in Debussy's "La Chevelure." Even more important is the way Miss Reps uses it, handling it with easy control in the shaping of musical phrases that are a constant delight.

Three songs of Mahler provided moments of particular pleasure, the first in its beautifully handled coloratura, the second in its dramatic use of color, and the third in its demonstration of astonishing vocal skill. Schumann's "Frauenliebe und Leben" is music that may call for more intensity in performance than Miss Reps provided. Her interpretation was sensitive, but generally restrained. And one who has heard her rare ability to perform baroque

music could not help but regret that this period was neglected on her program in favor of the nineteenth century.

But it was a HAPPY EVENING—an evening which left the INDELIBLE IMPRESSION that one had had the privilege here of meeting with a MUSICIAN OF DISTINCTION.
